Last Leaders' Retreat Sets the Stage for Continued Cooperation

The Seventh Leaders' Retreat between then Prime Minister Lee Hsien Loong and outgoing President Jokowi focussed on strengthening the already strong bilateral economic cooperation and strategic partnership established by the two leaders




A lthough this was the final Leaders' Retreat for PM Lee and President Jokowi there was still a strong sense of continuity very much in the air as the Indonesian President together with Defence Minister and President-Elect Prabowo Subianto, welcomed then Singapore Prime Minister Lee Hsien Loong and his successor then Deputy Prime Minister Lawrence Wong at the Bogor Palace on 29th April 2024.

Both groups of outgoing and future leaders worked on a mission to reinforce the longstanding relationship between the two nations, focusing on shared interests and collaborative ventures. Key discussions included the Flight Information Region (FIR) in the Riau Islands and Natuna, the 2022 Extradition Agreement, the 2007 Defence Cooperation Pact, and the 2014 Agreement on Territorial Sea Boundaries. The leaders also explored ways to enhance cooperation in investment and trade.


On the Agenda

In the run up to the Seventh Leaders' Retreat Indonesia's Minister of Coordinating Economic Affairs, Airlangga Hartarto, met with Singaporean Foreign Minister Dr. Vivian Balakrishnan in Jakarta on 23rd April 2024 to discuss preparations for the upcoming Retreat

The ministers highlighted strong economic relations between Indonesia and Singapore and explored potential areas of bilateral cooperation, that included:

Green energy initiatives such as solar farms and carbon capture storage
Development of the Batam-Bintan-Karimun area, digital connectivity, and data centres. Minister Airlangga also emphasised the importance of building data centers around the Indonesian Capital City, also known as Ibu Kota Nusantara (IKN), to support its modern and digital pursuits concept. The Retreat also addressed hospital investment in health care within the Special Economic Zone (SEZ) for Health in Sanur, Bali. Head of the Ministry of Health Communication and Public Service Bureau, noted that agreements were finalised to establish 16 healthcare service centres and clinics, including international providers such as Mayo Clinic and aesthetic clinics from South Korea. Discussions included strengthening biomedical research and genome sequencing, supported by Singapore's Temasek Foundation through training and scholarships.

These meetings and agreements highlight the commitment of Indonesia and Singapore to deepen their bilateral relations and drive regional economic growth and stability. The Leaders' Retreat emphasised strategic cooperation in various sectors, including human resource development, healthcare, and green energy, underscoring the importance of fostering strong and mutually beneficial partnerships between the two nations.

Interview Mr. IGAK Satrya Wibawa Enhancing Educational and Cultural Ties between Singapore and Indonesia

Mr. Igak Satrya Wibawa, education and culture attaché, discusses his role in strengthening the educational and cultural collaboration between Singapore and Indonesia

n this exclusive interview with Sun Media, Mr. IGAK Satrya Wibawa, the Education and Culture Attaché at the Indonesian Embassy in Singapore, shared insights into his role and the ongoing efforts to strengthen educational and cultural ties between Singapore and Indonesia.

We want to know more about you, your department, and the collaboration between Singapore and Indonesia. You have been here for almost two years now. How have you settled in Singapore?

I joined about two years ago, and my family is here with me. My wife and two daughters are studying in Singapore. The first one is in primary school and will soon be in high school. We came from Bali, which is a special place for us.

Tell us about your career path and your role in the embassy.

I was a lecturer at a public university in Indonesia, teaching and working on various projects. When this position opened in 2021, I saw it as an opportunity to face new challenges and explore new opportunities. Here in Singapore, I lead several programs to enhance collaboration between our two countries.

What are your thoughts on the education system in Indonesia, and how do you see collaboration with Singapore?

Under the leadership of our Minister, we promote innovative and motivating educational practices. Our goal is to tailor education to different contexts, like those in Jakarta and Papua. We emphasize project-based learning and encourage students to explore and enjoy the learning process. Singapore's education system serves as a benchmark for us, and we aim to learn from their experiences while considering our cultural context.

How are job opportunities for students back in Indonesia?

The job market is evolving rapidly, and



it's essential to provide students with a solid foundation of knowledge and skills to prepare for future opportunities. The government is working to ensure that education is accessible and free, especially in state schools. We face challenges due to our diverse geography, but we strive to provide the necessary resources and support.

Could you update us on the recent visit of your minister and its significance?

In 2021, we agreed to enhance our efforts in various programs, including student exchanges and research collaborations. We've opened a research center facilitated by NUS, and we are working on more initiatives to strengthen our educational ties.

How do you engage with the Indonesian student community in Singapore?

We have around 8,000 to 10,000 Indonesian students in Singapore, from primary school to post-doctoral studies. Singapore offers a conducive environment for our students, with its strong education system and cultural similarities. Many students seek job opportunities in Singapore after graduation, but we also encourage them to return to Indonesia and contribute to our development.

What are some of your cultural initiatives in Singapore?

We support various cultural programs and collaborations with local art schools. We have upcoming events and performances planned to promote Indonesian culture in Singapore. Our embassy maintains an open and friendly environment, welcoming everyone as friends rather than guests.

You have a significant role in education and culture. How do you manage it all?

It's not just a job; it's something I love. Connecting with people and promoting our culture is a passion of mine. The embassy operates on the principle that everyone who visits is a friend, and we strive to create a warm and welcoming atmosphere.

What changes do you anticipate with the new government in Indonesia?

The new government will continue building on our current foundation. We may revise some aspects to better align with global trends, but the core principles will remain the same. We are also looking at potential collaborations with foreign universities, including those from Singapore, to further enhance our education system.

Interview Rizki Kusumastuti Young Diplomat Rizki Kusumastuti Serving Indonesia and Family with Love

Through Backstory, we bring you stories of people, the paths they take, and the destinations they arrive at. IndoConnect spoke to Indonesian diplomat Rizki Kusumastuti, the First Secretary at the Embassy of Indonesia in Singapore, Pensobud – Information, Social and Cultural Affairs Department. She shared her story of a childhood dream to work outside Indonesia, which has become a way for her to serve her country

izki Kusumastuti, First Secretary at the Republic of Indonesia Embassy in Singapore (Pensobud) was born and raised in Surabaya, East Java, Indonesia. She grew up with the childhood dream to work and live abroad, not knowing what was the career path that could become a gateway to achievin her dreams of working and living abroad. During her time to choose a study programme to apply to a university, she was clueless about what to pursue. She attended several alumni talks which gave here a 'Eureka' moment to study International Law. Not knowing then that it would be the first step towards achieving her childhood dream. It was by accident that she came to know about CPNS (Calon Pegawai Negeri Sipil) the test which qualified one to get into government service. While working in the private sector she took the exam; as luck would have it, she cleared all the steps and landed a job in the foreign service.

Diplomatic Journey

Rizki's entry into the foreign services in 2009 marked the beginning of an enriching journey. Her first posting in Finland presented a stark contrast to Indonesia's warm climate, introducing her to a different climatic conditions and way of life. Her husband, who she lauds for "dependability and committment" was willing to be a trailing spouse, but he was in ascendant in his career path, and Rizki thought it would be unfair for him to leave Indonesia at that point. She along with their two children arrived in Finland to promote and represent the interests of Indonesia; she got a lot of support from her parents and sister. The two young boys Wisanggeni Anwar and Antasena Anwar, were with her in Finland in the early years of their childhood. Rizki navigated the complexities of balancing a demanding career with family responsibilities, emphasising the importance of shared responsibilities in marriage. Her husband, Anwar Sadat, is now with her in Singapore





as a trailing spouse. She says her husband is very understanding and hopes more men would be able to step in for their wives if the career so demands. Rizki's story underscores the societal need for equal participation in parenting responsibilities, especially for women pursuing demanding careers.

She likes Singapore for its cleanliness and safety and while promoting ties between Singapore and Indonesia she has the ease of bringing up her children with the support of her husband. "I like how my childhood dream of living abroad has created opportunities for my family. I am proud to represent Indonesia in Singapore. I want to invite Singaporeans to explore our rich and vast and beautiful country. Singaporeans should look beyond Bali. While we are very proud of the contribution of domestic workers Singapore companies can explore the large talent pool of young Indonesians, for investors, the policies have been further simplified and streamlined. Come work with us."

Medical Tourism: Collaboration with SingHealth to Boost <mark>Bali</mark> International Hospital

Pertamina's BUMN Hospital Holding partners with Singapore's SingHealth to enhance Bali International Hospital, aiming to elevate it into a medical tourism destination



he state-owned hospital holding company PT Pertamina Bina Medika-Indonesia Healthcare Corporation (IHC) has teamed up with Singaporean healthcare institution, SingHealth, through a collaboration aimed at enhancing healthcare services to strengthen Bali International Hospital (BIH) as a medical tourism destination.

"Bali International Hospital is still under construction, and our plan is to open in September 2024," stated IHC's President Director, Dr. Mira Dyah Wahyuni, in Sanur, Denpasar, Bali, on Tuesday, 30th April 2024.

To facilitate this, IHC signed a memorandum of understanding (MoU) with SingHealth, represented by Dr. Mira Dyah Wahyuni alongside SingHealth's Group CEO, Ng Wai Hoe, it was witnessed by Singapore's Minister of Health, Ong Ye Kung, in the Special Economic Zone (SEZ) of Sanur, Denpasar, Bali. The MoU outlines cross-sharing of clinical practices, innovations, and training to enhance the quality of healthcare services in both countries. Through this partnership, IHC will gain access to knowledge and expertise in healthcare services from Singapore, particularly in hospital management, staff training, as well as research and development, which includes professional competency.

Three priority areas are emphasised: focusing on quality, patient safety, and research; enhancing customer experience through innovation and transformation; and sustainable development of healthcare professionals, including doctors, nurses, and management.

SingHealth's Group CEO, Ng Wai Hoe, views this collaboration as a significant potential for both entities to enhance healthcare services and training for professionals, including doctors, nurses, and healthcare administration.

Specialisations

Regarding BIH services, the President Director of IHC explained that the hospital specialises in cancer care, particularly with positron emission tomography (PET) scanning for advanced cancer therapy, a service currently available in only three medical facilities, all centralised in Jakarta.

Covering approximately five hectares of the total 41.26-hectare SEZ for Health in Sanur, BIH also provides treatment for other diseases related to cardiology, oncology, neurology/stroke, gastroenterology, and orthopaedics.

The government expects facilities in the Health SEZ can improve the economy while enhancing healthcare facilities in Indonesia. Based on data from the National SEZ Council, by 2030, around 4-8% of Indonesia's population or 123-240 thousand people who previously sought treatment abroad, are projected to seek treatment domestically, including at BIH.

Nominally, it is expected that by 2045, total foreign exchange savings will reach Rp 86 trillion, with an additional Rp 19.6 trillion in foreign exchange earnings during the same period. The National SEZ Council also states that the Health SEZ in Sanur has an investment value of Rp 10.2 trillion, and is anticipated to create job opportunities.

Makassar New Port: Eastern Indonesia's Gateway to the World

Transportation Minister Budi Karya Sumadi expresses optimism over the potential impact of Makassar New Port on regional development following its inauguration on 22nd February 2024 by President Jokowi

ndonesian Transportation Minister Budi Karya Sumadi conveyed his optimism regarding the newly inaugurated Makassar New Port, highlighting its potential to drive economic growth and equality in eastern Indonesia. He highlighted the importance of enhancing maritime connectivity to bolster the nation's progress, as stated in a release from his office on 22 February 2024.

Minister Sumadi accompanied President Joko Widodo who attended the inauguration ceremony of the Makassar New Port in Makassar, South Sulawesi, on 22nd February 2024. The port is poised to strengthen Makassar's position as a crucial logistics gateway in eastern Indonesia and facilitate connectivity to international trade routes. Bapak Sumadi underscored that the Makassar New Port stands out as one of Indonesia's

most robust ports, equipped to accommodate large vessels from around the world. With a current capacity of 2.5 million TEUs (twenty-foot equivalent units) annually, the port is positioned to emerge as a national and world-class international hub, he noted.

President Jokowi emphasised the significance of Makassar New Port in reducing logistics costs across Indonesia, particularly in the eastern region. He highlighted the substantial decline in logistics costs over the past decade,



albeit still slightly higher compared to other countries, while attributing the reduction to improved integration between ports and industrial areas.

The president also addressed the issue of dwelling time, which has seen significant improvement, with the average duration now below three days. Notably, the port's capacity has been augmented by 150 percent, reaching 2.5 million TEUs annually, while the time for ships to dock has been reduced to a maximum of 24 hours, down from the previous 48 hours.

Development Plans for Port Dumai and Port Selat Lampa

Minister Budi Karya Sumadi announces plans for the enhancement of Port Dumai in Riau and Port Selat Lampa in the Riau Islands to optimize their potential and functions

ransportation Minister Bapak Budi Karya Sumadi unveiled plans for the further development of Port Dumai in Riau Province and Port Selat Lampa in Riau Islands Province during his visit to the provinces on 8 February 2024.

Minister Pak Sumadi highlighted the untapped potential of Dumai Port and the need for its maximal utilization, especially considering the significant volume of mobility between Malaysia and Indonesia via the port.

To leverage this potential, Sumadi directs PT Pelindo, the state-owned port management company, to initiate revitalization efforts for Dumai Port, focusing on dredging ponds



and expanding the passenger terminal capacity. During his visit to Port Selat Lampa in Natuna District, Riau Islands, Minister Sumadi underscored the port's promising prospects due to its deep and calm waters. He emphasized the necessity of constructing terminals and container areas to harness this potential effectively.

Addressing the accessibility challenges of Selat Lampa Port, Sumadi pledged collaborative efforts between the Transportation Ministry, the Public Works and Public Housing Ministry, and other stakeholders to improve accessibility and optimize the port's functions. Selat Lampa Port, situated in the strategic region of Natuna

Islands along international shipping routes, holds significance in Indonesia's efforts toward equitable development across all regions, including frontier territories like Natuna Islands, under President Joko

BRIN: Ambon City Key Site for Blue Economy R&D

Indonesia's National Research and Innovation Agency (BRIN) has identified Ambon in Maluku Province as a prime hub for pioneering blue economy

eputy Head of BRIN, Admiral Amarulla Octavian, underscored the strategic significance of Ambon's marine resources during his visit to the city on Tuesday, 20th February 2024. This, he said, can heighten collaborative efforts to propel Indonesian maritime research to new heights.

Admiral Octavian's visit included inspections of the Deep Sea Research Centre's laboratories, where discussions with researchers underscored the importance of forging partnerships with domestic and international institutions for advancing marine exploration and development.

The integration of cutting-edge maritime technology into BRIN's innovation agenda aims to bolster sustainable marine food estate management and foster the growth of the blue economy, leveraging Ambon's abundant marine resources as a competitive edge in Indonesian marine research.



Smart Fishing Village

Ambon City's smart fishing village initiative, centred in the coastal area of Poka, is a testament to collaborative efforts between the Ministry of Marine Affairs and Fisheries (MMAF), Fisheries Training and Counselling Center (BP3), Ambon City Government, and stakeholders, with a focus on developing lobster and tuna centres to enhance community livelihoods.

The Maluku provincial government aligns the blue economy development with its commitment to sustainable natural resource management, emphasising the imperative of environmental preservation, particularly along coastal areas, to sustain the region's marine wealth and economic prosperity. Efforts to address plastic waste and maintain environmental quality are central to realising Maluku's blue economy potential, as underscored by Assistant II of the Maluku Regional Secretariat, Ibu Habiba Saimima, citing research indicating a rise in plastic waste density in Maluku waters over the past decades.

Editor's Note: In economic terms, blue economy refers to the exploitation, preservation and regeneration of the marine environment.

Indonesia Discusses Agrarian Reform Cooperation with

Minister AHY meets with World Bank representatives to explore collaborative schemes for accelerating agrarian reform programmes

ndonesian Agrarian Affairs and Spatial Planning (ATR) Minister Agus Harimurti Yudhoyono (AHY) engaged in discussions with representatives from the World Bank on Wednesday (20 March) regarding potential collaboration and ongoing initiatives related to agrarian reform programs. AHY emphasised the importance of agrarian affairs and spatial planning in stimulating economic growth while prioritising environmentally friendly practices and responsiveness to climate change.

The ATR Ministry and the World Bank have been collaborating on various

programs, with the Agrarian Reform Acceleration Program (PPRA) standing out as a flagship initiative. This program aims to expedite land registration and administration processes to provide legal certainty over all

land parcels in Indonesia. Implementation strategies include guiding individuals to collect agrarian data and promoting digital transformation.

The PPRA is currently operational in 10 provinces across Indonesia, including Riau, Jambi, South Sumatra, West



Kalimantan, Central Kalimantan, South Kalimantan, East Kalimantan, West Java, Central Java, and East Java. Minister AHY highlighted the program's progress and its crucial role in achieving targeted outcomes in land administration.

Soesatyo Invites Singapore to Invest in New Capital City

Bapak Bambang Soesatyo, the Speaker of the People's Consultative Assembly (MPR), welcomes Singaporean investment in Indonesia's Nusantara during a meeting with Singapore Ambassador to Indonesia, H.E. Kwok Fook Seng

he Speaker of the People's Consultative Assembly (MPR), Bapak Bambang Soesatyo, extended an invitation to Singapore to invest in Indonesia's new capital city, Nusantara, during a meeting with Singaporean Ambassador H.E. Kwok Fook Seng in Jakarta on 1st March 2024.

Bapak Soesatyo reassured potential investors, including those from Singapore, of Indonesia's safety and peace following the 14th February 2024 general elections, as he emphasised the country's stability for investment opportunities.

"Financing for the new capital development comes from the state budget, business entity work agreements (KPBU), and private investment," he affirmed in an official statement from the MPR. Highlighting the positive bilateral relations between Indonesia and Singapore, Bapak Soesatyo underscored Singapore's strategic importance as Indonesia's largest trading partner in Southeast Asia. He cited data showing Singapore as Indonesia's top investor from 2010 to 2023, (except for 2013), with investments totalling US\$15.4 billion, surpassing China's investment of US\$7.4 billion.

Bapak Soesatyo noted that Singapore's investments are diverse, spanning sectors such as transportation, telecommunications, agriculture, and mining, with a significant presence in various Indonesian regions. He emphasised the ample opportunities for Singaporean investment in the development of the new capital city in East Kalimantan, with wide-ranging prospects for collaboration.



Bapak Soesatyo revealed that the Indonesian government has allocated Rp75.4 trillion (around US\$4.79 billion) from the state budget for Nusantara's development until 2024, with 23 investors already involved, contributing a total of Rp41 trillion (around US\$2.6 billion) to ongoing projects.

Indonesia Outline Green Steel Initiatives at SGSF

Ambassador Suryo Pratomo underlined Indonesia's commitment to decarbonization and outlined strategies for greener steel production at the Singapore Green Steel Forum

S peaking at the Panel Discussion of the Singapore Green Steel Forum held at Sands Expo and Convention Centre on 7th May 2024, Ambassador Suryo Pratomo shared insights on the "Progress and Outlook of Global Steel Industry's Green Transformation."

Ambassador Suryo Pratomo, representing Indonesia, emphasised the nation's pledge to reduce GHG emissions by 31.89% by 2030 and achieve net-zero emissions by 2060. With Indonesia emerging as the largest steel producer in Southeast Asia, boasting a production capacity of 16 million tonnes in 2023, projected to rise to 33-35 million tonnes by 2030, Pratomo underlined the importance of accelerating decarbonization efforts. He highlighted the steel industry's large contribution to global GHG emissions, which is estimated around 7%.

In his discourse, Ambassador Suryo Pratomo outlined Indonesia's main decarbonization strategies, including the adoption of natural-based solutions (NBS), the establishment of carbon markets, promoting renewable energy sources such as geothermal, solar, and bioethanol, advancing hydrogen and CCUS projects, fortifying the electric vehicle ecosystem, and prioritising the use of local raw materials for industry-specific local content.

The panel, moderated by Prof. Annie Koh of the Singapore Management University, featured notable industry figures such as Mr. Chen Qiang (Managing Director,



Boosteel SG), Mr. Ian Hiscock (Head of Consulting, China and SEA, CRU), Mr. Mike Zhang (Managing Director, Global Head of Metals and Mining, DBS), and Mr. Kelvin Fu (Managing Partner, Gunung Capital).

Indonesia's Vision for Water: Investment Opportunities

The Indonesian government aims to improve access to safe drinking water significantly by 2024, outlining a comprehensive plan involving major investments



he Indonesia Business Forum themed "Water Infrastructure Investment Opportunities in Indonesia," was held at the Singapore International Water Week 2024 on 21st June 2024. Co-organized by the Indonesian Chamber of Commerce and Industry (KADIN), the forum featured a number of distinguished speakers who discussed important opportunities and challenges in enhancing Indonesia's water infrastructure to meet future demands.

By 2024, the Indonesian government aims to ensure that 15% of the population can access safe drinking water, 30% benefit from piped drinking water, and all households have access to adequate drinking water. This initiative requires a budget of IDR 130 trillion, with 24% expected from public-private partnerships and B2B collaborations.

Other water investment areas, including water supply projects in the Kariangau Industrial Area and Balikpapan, are crucial for supporting the development of Indonesia's new Nusantara Capital City. Furthermore, there is an urgent need for clean water supply for marine vessels, as many major ports struggled to meet the demand for potable water. Another promising sector is hydropower plants, which taps into Indonesia's huge renewable energy potential, estimated at 94% or 95 GW, but much of it remains untapped.

The distinguished speakers who participated in this forum are Vice Chairman of Public



Works, Public Housing, and Infrastructure at KADIN Ir. Insanul Khamil; Former Expert Staff/Senior Advisor at the Coordinating Ministry for Maritime and Investment Affairs of the Republic of Indonesia Mr Basilio Dias Araujo; and Director of the Indonesia Investment Promotion Center (IIPC) and Investment Attache at the Ministry of Investment, Embassy of Indonesia in Singapore. Mr Andria Buchara.

Discussions at the forum underscored an ambitious plan that presented significant opportunities for investment in water infrastructure and technology. Stakeholders emphasised the importance of sustainable and efficient water management practices to achieve the outlined goals.



Sason Jovi is the producer of the latest musical production (in English) that was staged by the student group of Indonesians at Nanyang Technological University otherwise known as PINTU. The cast and crew had come from diverse backgrounds from all over Indonesia and many are from the engineering and business faculties but their yearly productions are polished with a professional-like sheen that attracts hundreds, if not thousands to support their annual productions.

And as expected, these productions always touch on various aspects of Indonesian life and cultural heritage. But this year's production titled 'Kaharsa A Musical' was a little different from their usual productions. Jason, who has already graduated with an engineering degree, said "Of course, many Indonesians including those in the diaspora and students here will notice the story's allegory to their own situation in coming to Singapore and whether they will stay here or go back home."

Push and pull factors, the relationships and attractions (and distractions) of the city play to sets, music and fashion of the Seventies – all brought to life with an original script, music, lyrics and choreography created and performed by the 150-member cast and crew who call themselves the Committee for the play for Kaharsa which means finding joy in living our passion in Sanskrit.

"We actually started planning this production at the beginning of 2023 with



the script and much research from the cultural side, whether it be the sets, the costumes, the music and how people behaved in that era; then throughout last August to December our Committee members have done many rehearsals to prepare for the presentation itself on 3rd February 2024 at the National Library Drama Centre Theatre," said Jason.

Challenges

The biggest challenges said Jason was that "We are a community of Indonesian NTU students so most of our practices, rehearsals and events or any other activities related to Kaharsa have to be done around our academic schedules and each ICN we have many uni students who have no prior background in performing or have been part of a musical performance. So we need to come together as a community to overcome this by learning and practicing these new theatre skills from more experienced members for us to be able to present a coherent story and structure in the performance that is also entertaining. At the core of what we want to share is how Indonesian culture used to be back in our home country but as we are young we had to do much research for the 70s period."
